Dancing outside in publicly visible locations is one of the suggestions adopted by the Federation Outreach Committee. Consider where your group could dance out of doors occasionally. Another suggestion adopted by the Outreach committee is to arrange for folk dance demonstrations & audience participation at community health fairs. Recreational folk dance is a "blue zone" activity that checks all the boxes for promoting a long, happy and healthful life. We know the benefits; let's show the world! Theodor Vasilescu

Ed's Note: The following was taken from the So. Cal Federation website.



Theodor Vasilescu was born to a well-to-do, landed family near Cluj in Transylvania. He had no contact with village life or with peasants as a child, took lessons on the accordion, piano, and violin as a child. At the age of fifteen or sixteen, he began playing tango, foxtrot, and swing music at dance balls. He also played music for a folklore group, realizing that folkloric music could bring his orchestra more contacts. At that time, his father lost his position in the army and the family had begun selling the family's possessions to make ends meet. The instructor for the amateur folkloric group Cununa Carpatilor Folklore Ensemble for which he played was the famous instructor and folklore collector, Gheorge Popescu-Judetz, from whom Theodor learned to dance and teach, when Gheorge noticed that Theodor was correcting the dancers' steps and styling. Theodor joined the group in 1947 and within two years, he had become more knowledgeable about folklore than any of the other members.

The family moved from Cluj to Bucharest in 1944. He was accepted as part of the youth dance team at the university whose rule was "No dance without documentation," requiring him to go into villages to do research, learn dances, and write everything down (no video in those days!). The group danced for television shows and for ballroom sessions. He studied ballroom dance and formed a group of four couples that taught and performed for quarter-hour television shows. This exposure led to his being asked to create choreographies in Romania. Theodor graduated with an M.S. degree as a chemical engineer, working in the morning and dancing in the afternoon.

In 1964, having taken over the position and responsibilities held by a retired ballet mistress, Theodor decided to follow folklore research as a fulltime profession. That same year, he choreographed dances for a group in The Netherlands and returned each year. He choreographed for professional dance ensembles such as AMAN International Music and Dance Company (Los Angeles), Budlet (Hong Kong), International Danstheater (Amsterdam), and L'Ensemble national de folklore "Les Sortilèges" (Montréal). He also has choreographed for several large open-air performances. He did numerous choreographies for professional and amateur ensembles in Romania.

From 1976 to 1985, Theodor was the Chief Choreographer of Romanian National Professional Ensemble *Rapsodia Romana*. He was head of Choreography at the National Center for the Preservation and Promotion of Folklore, was head choreographer for *Cununa Carpatilor Folklore Ensemble* in Bucharest, and was a teacher of Romanian folk and character dance at the Theater and Film Academy of Bucharest.

Under the socialist regime it was not easy for Theodor to leave Romania. His first visit to Japan in March of 1986 was possible because it was organized by the Japanese Folkdance Federation, which had official connections in Bucharești. That same year he was invited to teach at Bora Özkök's camp but was not allowed to leave Romania because of "official national duties." After 1990, travel became easier and Theodor taught in Germany, Hong Kong, and the United States.

Theodor was an independent choreographer and dance instructor, as well as the leader of the Folklore Dance Academy and the president of the National Association of Folklore Choreographers of Romania.

He began writing, editing, and publishing books on dance and methods of teaching folkloric dance, publishing more than 56 volumes. He developed and perfected a dance notation system specifically for folkloric studies that was less complicated than that of Laban. This notation system is currently used by professional and amateur choreographers throughout Romania and other countries. He also authored *Folclor Coregrafic Romanesc* (Romanian Folklore Dances), based on several years of research throughout Romania, that includes a collection of 130 dances from all parts of the country.

Lia Vasilescu was born in Sibiu, an old town and important cultural center in the Transylvania region. She was attracted by music and dance, and studied classical music and ballet at the local Art School. After graduating from high school, she attended the University in Bucharest, graduating as an English teacher. While in Bucharest, she became interested in folk dance and joined the amateur group *Cununa Carpatilor Folklore Ensemble*, where she met Theodor Vasilescu, then the group's choreographer and dance teacher. The group toured Belgium, China, France, Germany, Italy, The Netherlands, Russia, Viet Nam, and several other European countries. Lia was a member of the group for 24 years.

Lia and Theodor were married in 1959 and have a son and two grand-children. The couple worked together in the field of research, enriching their knowledge about the traditional life and the creation of Romanian villages.

Theodor and his charming wife, Lia, participated in many workshops, which endeared them to many dance communities. Beginning in 1990, Lia started teaching workshops and weekend camps together with Theodor in California, Maine, New Mexico, New York, Texas, and Washington. They gave workshops and master lessons throughout Canada, Finland, Hong Kong, Germany, Japan, The Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland, Taiwan, and the United States, presenting with a style that was swiftly paced, yet attentive to details.

Several dance teachers, such as Sunni Bloland, Cristian Florescu and Niko Hilferink, have popularized many of Theodor's dances.

Lia passed away on October 20, 2018, Theodor in February 2024

Ed's Note: The following was taken from Lia and Theodor's website, <u>Theodor Vasilescu and Lia</u> <u>Vasilescu - Romanian Folk Dance Experts</u>



Theodor Vasilescu was an independent choreographer, lecturer, folklore & traditional dance researcher, Romanian folklore and character dance teacher.

He was the chief choreographer of the famous Romanian National Professional Ensemble *Rapsodia Română* and he led for 43 years *Cununa Carpaților* Folklore Ensemble from Bucharest.

From 1964 to 1994 Theodor was the head of Choreographic Section at the National Center for the Preservation and Promotion of Folklore. In this important position he compiled collections of dances and traditions in villages. For several years he was teacher of Romanian folk and character dance at the Choreographic Department of the Theater and Film Academy from Bucharest.

He was President of the National Association of Folklore Choreographers of Romania

Theodor is the author of a system of Romanian character dance studies used in various dance ensembles from Romania and abroad.

Theodor and Lia Vasilescu realized and recorded on DVD 11 programs of Romanian folk dances for recreational purposes. Each program contains between 18 up to 26 dances representing almost all the regions of Romania.

Theodor graduated as dipl. chemical engineer but decided in 1964 to follow folklore research and dance as a full-time profession.

Lia Vasilescu- was born in Sibiu, an old town and important cultural center of Transylvania region. After high school, in her birthplace, she attended the University in Bucharest, Faculty of Philology which she graduated as an English teacher.

Even during school in Sibiu she was attracted by music and dance, studying classical music and taking ballet lessons at the local art school. When Lia started her studies in Bucharest she began her approach towards the folk dance, becoming a dancer in the folklore dance ensemble "Cununa Carpaţilor". There she met Theodor Vasilescu, the choreographer and dance teacher of this ensemble. They married in 1959. She was of great help by her methodical spirit of organization. With "Cununa Carpaţilor", as a dancer, Lia made numerous tours in Germany, The Netherlands, Belgium, France, Italy, China, Vietnam, Russia and many other countries. She danced in this group for 24 years.

Since 1990, together with Theodor, she started to teach workshops, week-ends, camps in USA (Stockton Camp, Mainewoods Camp, Mendocino Camp, at different groups in North and South California, Alaska, New Mexico, Oregon, Minnesota, Texas, Maine, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Florida, Virginia, Ohio, Washington DC, New York), Europe (The Netherlands, Germany, Finland, Spain, Italy), Japan, Taiwan and Hong Kong.



TED MARTIN

Ted Martin died peacefully in Irvine, California on February 15, 2024, at the age of 93. He was a beloved husband, father and brother, and a friend to all he met. He will be greatly missed.

Ted was born May 28, 1930, in Madison, Wisconsin, where he grew up with his parents and sister, Alice Liska. Ted had many interests from a young age, and according to Alice, the adoring younger sister now of Santa Fe, NM, he was recognized for his intellectual gifts early on. Once he graduated high school, Ted entered the University of Wisconsin in Madison, where he met and married Marlise Kassowitz in 1954. They went on to Cambridge, Massachusetts, where Ted attended graduate school at MIT in electrical engineering.

In 1958, the growing family relocated to Southern California for Ted's job at Rockwell International. Ted and Marli's children, Gail, Jill and Greg, now all of Berkeley, remember their childhood in Southern California with great fondness, for the variety of fun and enriching activities the family participated in. In addition to folk dancing and river trips, they camped and backpacked, played numerous sports and instruments, attended many performances, and the list goes on. Whichever activities Ted was interested in, he gave them his all, whether it was scuba diving, carpentry, running marathons or folk dancing.

Folk dancing first caught Ted's interest during his college years. In the 1960's, the family of five danced in Whittier, then in Garden Grove (later Orange County Folk Dancers), on a weekly basis. Ted and Marli were in Polski Iskri, a Polish performing group, for several years. In the 1970s, upon moving to Laguna Beach, they danced weekly in the Girl's Gvm. In the mid-70's. Ted saw a need, and started the Sunday night beginners' class, which continued for decades. Eventually. Ted fell in love with Scandinavian dance, and traveled there and to other parts of Europe to enjoy and learn about local dance and culture. Later, he taught a Scandinavian class that continued until fairly recently. He received a Silver Medal for his special competence in Swedish dance and a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Laguna Folk Dance Festival. Ted was what some (non-dancers) might call a fanatic about dance, attending several times per week. He believed that 'there is a way to move around the dance floor that is almost magical', and that 'when you make these

dances part of you, they will be a joy for life'.

In 2003, he married fellow dancer Carol Epperson. Together, they enjoyed many, many camps and festivals over the years, including Mendocino/ Scandia, Stockton, Julian and Laguna. Ted is survived by Carol, as well as by his sister Alice, 3 children and 5 grandchildren. There will be a memorial service on Sunday, May 26th, at Leisure World in Seal Beach. The time is to be determined.

Ted was also a dedicated connoisseur of classical ballet. Ted and Carol sat in the front row of the Segerstrom Theatre for each performance of the American Ballet Theater, New York City Ballet, and every other classical company that performed at the theatre. He was proud of being a season ticket holder for every performance!

Ted not only taught the beginner class for Laguna Folk Dance, he mentored newcomers any evening when they showed up to dance. He also served as President and engineer-in-chief! He devoted countless volunteer hours to converting records to individual cassettes to CD's to mp3 files on club computers. Ted installed the software to play dance tunes and continually upgraded the computer files. He taught himself how to video record dance instruction, to wire speakers for the festival and numerous additional audio and computer tasks. Laguna Folkdancers seamlessly enjoyed dancing for decades thanks to Ted's quiet expertise in managing the music and electronics.

Highlights from the Federation Council meeting of January 24, 2024

ELECTED OFFICER REPORTS

President Diane Baker. Diane noted that as we still don't have a membership chairperson, she combined the membership report with her president's report. She would like to hear from any delegate whose club had an increase in membership, specifically what they did to encourage the increase. She noted an article by Dick Oakes posted to the Federation website dealing with ideas to revitalize folk dance: "Decline and Resurrection of Recreational International Folk Dance." Diane encouraged all members to choose one suggested action from the article and have their club engage in that action throughout 2024.

Vice President Greg Solloway. Upcoming Federation-sponsored events:

1. East-West February 17, 2024, 1 – 5:30 p.m. Cerritos (previously approved).

2. Pre-concert dancing to *Sans Frontieres* February 13, 2024.

3. Laguna Fest March 1-3, 2024 Laguna Woods. 38 people have signed up for complete passport. Gergana Panova and Roberto Bagnoli are the teachers. As it is expensive to bring two teachers over from Europe, the objective is to have 70 to 80 attendees to help cover costs. There will be two bands featured. Marcella Lawson is collecting recommendations for the Lifetime Achievement Award.

4. Spring Fest, April 20, 2024, Somis, Cal. (previously approved). The hall has a good wood floor, there is plenty of parking, there is a 10-dollar admission, and the hours are 1 to 5 p.m. There is a need for a club member to take charge of the Fest.

5. Cerritos 15th Anniversary Party, June 8, 2024, from 1 – 5:30 p.m. 6. Statewide May 17-19, 2024 Newark, Northern California. Cesar Garfiaz, Yannis Konstantino.

APPOINTED OFFICERS' REPORTS

Insurance Chairperson, Julith Neff. The certificate period is from November 9 to November 9. Julith put in for new certificates for all the clubs for the latest certificate period. There was a problem with Conejo Valley Parks and Recreation due to two additional insured requests which Julith is dealing with.

STANDING COMMITTEE CHAIR REPORTS

Fall Camp, November 10 – 12, 2023 From Lee Otterholt: Fifty-seven people attended. There was a negative balance of \$1257, which in the large scheme of things was acceptable. Both master teachers were not able to attend so Lee and Joan Hantman stepped in to teach. Also, Terry Gucwa was not able to attend to lead the Potluck Band, but the band managed to present music. We had to improvise and it all worked out. There were lots of positive comments about the event. See appended report for further details. For Fall Camp 2024, Steve Kotansky is 1st on the list for guest teacher. Lee indicated that he will continue as camp chairperson for one more year. Fall Camp 2024 will be held the weekend before Thanksgiving, November 22 to 24. Discussion: the progress of Camp Hess Cramer is being monitored. Camp Hess might not be the same after its reconstruction and it might be more expensive than previous years. We now have institutional knowledge built up for Brandeis. Working scholarships and grants were presented as ideas for reducing cost of registration for Fall Camp. These ideas should be brought to the Finance Committee.

Visiting Master Teacher, Jay Michtom. Jaap Leegwater and his accompanist will be coming to Southern California in April 2024. Those workshops will be coordinated by Sherry Cochran. Federation clubs that participate also will be eligible for Federation reimbursement. His accompanist, Philippe, is available for accordion lessons.

Scholarship, Carol Smith. Two scholarships were issued in 2023. No scholarship applications have been received for 2024. It was recognized that there is a need to promote scholarships and educate dancers about their availability. Discussion and suggestions: distribute information in club meetings, develop a flyer that club leaders can distribute to club members; club leaders need to clarify the process; website search for scholarship needs repair, send request to Dick Oakes to fix this; scholarships to include mileage reimbursement; periodically write article for Scene about scholarship opportunities. All suggestions should be sent to Carol Smith and she will report at next Federation meeting.

business cards. Operations to promote recreational folk dance were discussed: classes through parks and recreation departments and senior centers that include simple dances with walk-throughs have been successful in bringing in new dancers; live bands and dance ensemble performances have generated interest.
