
CONCURSO DE T-SHIRTS!

COSTUME CORNER

Women's costumes from Matyó area, Hungary

Last month in *Scene* I looked at the gorgeously embroidered costumes of Matyó men, in NE Hungary. Now for the women. In fact, much in these costumes is relatively new, as European folk dress goes. In the 19th century, the Matyó area was quite impoverished, since the land there was not sufficiently productive to feed its people. To acquire further income, most men went off for many years to hire out as laborers elsewhere, sending money home to help their families. Matyó clothes were notably poor and plain. But the women at home found that they could make and sell embroideries to visitors, to help out. Hungarian winters tend to be long, cold, and snowy, providing many hours best spent with indoor activities such as embroidery and woodworking. In fact, when I was first in Hungary in the fall of 1979, I was told that to buy nice embroidery I needed to come in the spring or summer, because by fall everything made the previous winter was already sold!

So the women of Mezőkövesd began to get together and design more and more elaborate embroideries: first for bedsheet-ends, then for pillowcases, tablecloths, shirts, aprons—anything they could sell. And of course,

wearing such objects themselves helped advertise this work (*Photo 1*). Forming themselves into something akin to a guild, the women labored so hard and so effectively together to develop a noteworthy style that by the late 1800s the men were able come home again and help promote the fame of Matyó village art.

Their most famous pattern is a densely satin-stitched type of flower now nicknamed the Matyó rose (*Photos 2, 1*)—but the style came originally from far-away sources. Back in the 17th century, when Britain's East India Company began importing cheap printed cottons from India, their British customers didn't care for the East Indian patterns. So the next year, the traders took along English crewel-work pattern books and instructed

the cotton printers to use patterns like those. Now, crewel-work flowers were usually embroidered in several tones of one color (plus green leaves); so imagine the horror of the British traders, when they returned the next year to India, to find the English patterns printed in a riot of many bright colors! Well, there was no other cheap cotton to buy, so they took it home...and *these* chintzes immediately became quite the rage throughout Europe! So much so, that after a few years the cheap flashy Indian cottons were threatening to ruin textile industries all over Europe. Thus, in 1686 and 1700 (respectively) France and England passed sumptuary legislation *outlawing* Indian chintzes. In fact, I've heard that, in France, if a woman were caught wearing them, she was to be stripped naked on the spot, and if a man were caught, he was to be thrown in jail.

Meanwhile, however, women all over Europe (and the New World colonies) had become so fond of wearing this brightly flowered white cloth, instead of the old, dark, single-colored clothing, that they began embroidering the multicolor versions of the designs onto their clothes (whether of cloth or leather), using satin-stitch to mimic the solid color-blocks used in printing. We can still trace this path sometimes, through a tiny quirk in the design: in the crewel designs and the chintzes, the flowers often came as sprays out of a little vase at the bottom center of the design. And here and there, that little vase persists at the bottom center of some large embroidery like an apron (*Photos 3*), although on blouses, shirts, etc. we see only the flowers. (Compare the similar flowers embroidered on so many Central American blouses and skirts!)

The Matyó women wear a full-length skirt and a bodice-like jacket cut in a manner similar to that of other NE Hungarian women. The sleeves might be long or short, but gathered to puff out over the shoulders. Below the bust, the jacket hugs the lower ribcage tightly, usually by means of a wide, flat, heavy strip, originally of a contrastively dark color, running all the way around (*Photo 4*). Most distinctive of all, the jacket then poufs out below in a sort of ruffle with a pronounced ducktail in back. This ruffle, which is bias-cut with extra fabric, may also be stiffened with wire. But stick out it must! (I'll discuss this ducktail, which occurs well beyond Hungary, in a future issue of *Scene*.) As the town became wealthier, the women changed the fabric of the jacket from cheap, plain, and dark, going first to monochrome flowered brocade (*Photo 4*) and then to brightly flowered challis (*Photo 5*).

Even the long skirt (Photos 1, cover, 6), often tightly pleated, could be of this bright challis, although earlier it was of pleated brocade. And atop all of this hangs a long, black, deeply fringed apron, densely embroidered across the middle with masses of "Matyó roses" (Photo 1),



much like the men's (see previous issue of Scene).

On their heads, the women had two types of traditional covering. One consisted of a fringed scarf wrapped over a tall, stiff form slanting to the back (*Photo* 7). It has either gone out of style completely, or has a special usage—I can no longer even find photos of it. The other consists of a tight-fitting turban covered with large balls of multicolored cotton tufts (*Photos 8 left, cover*). Interestingly, I have found images of just such a hat worn in Hungary by ladies of

the late medieval to Renaissance era (*Photo 8 right*). What I have not been able to learn is whether this eyecatching chapeau is a re-adoption, or a survivor across four centuries!



STANDING COMMITTEE CHAIR REPORTS

Fall Camp November 22 - 24, 2024

From Lee Otterholt: In May and June, the committee posted notices to "save the date" on social media. More social media ads will be posted soon. Ads have been placed in Scene and Let's Dance publications

Thirteen people have registered. Lee will be emphasizing that registration is limited to 60 people. It was noted that the date of Fall Camp this year lands close to the Kolo festival in Northern California, which may discourage some dancers in that area from attending. It was also noted that people outside of California could consider the two festivals as a vacation package.

Teachers this year are Genci Kastrati from Albania teaching Albanian dance, and Ira Weisburd from Florida teaching International. Marc and Jan Rayman have once again subsidized the teachers' travel.

After last year's Fall Camp, Lee asked volunteers if they were willing to fulfill the same roles in 2024 and most of them said they would. Lee will be contacting the volunteers soon.

Reviewing dances from summer dance camps was discussed. It was proposed that one master teacher be hired and that the rest of the time be spent reviewing. This was tabled for future consideration.

AD HOC COMMITTEE REPORTS

Statewide 2025, May 2nd to 4th

From Margaret Lange: Hampton Inn has quoted a group rate of \$159 for a room with a king bed and \$169 for a room with two queen beds. A hot breakfast with eggs is included and the hotel is an eightminute drive from the dance hall.

It is planned to have Saturday night's meal catered at the dance hall, plus maybe one lunch catered as a box lunch. The rest of the meals can be taken offsite in the adjacent Arroyo Grande Village, which has multiple restaurants and it is only a three-minute drive.

Options such as tote bags, seat cushions, drinking cups, and cooling scarves were discussed as an alternative to festival t-shirts.

A Maypole dance is planned.

The committee has invited a local contra dance caller to participate. A contra dance will close each set of dances throughout the evening dance parties.

From 1 to 3 p.m. on Sunday, the community will be invited to attend a free beginning folk dance session, open to children and adults.

Margaret will handle mail-in registration and Diane Baker will handle online registration.

The procedure for compiling dance sets was discussed.

OLD BUSINESS

The Pasadena Art Walk on October 4th. Toti O'Brien as chairperson has devoted countless hours to visiting venues. The preferred venue which has space for dance did not extend an invitation to the Federation for October. Another preferred venue did extend an invitation for May Pasadena Art Night. And another arts facility has shown interest; she expects confirmation by September 1st.

Billy Burke has agreed to teach one-day dance training and is searching for venues. The workshop's purpose is to enable current folk dancers to teach small community groups, and a secondary purpose is to polish the teaching of new dances.

Greg Solloway is researching dance demonstrations at health fairs and community centers. He will attend a board meeting of the Irvine Multicultural Club to explore a presentation and/or demonstration of dance. Additionally, Greg has determined that there is space for a dance demonstration at a health fair at a senior center in Irvine

and he is applying for a booth in 2025.

The two Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) classes are proceeding smoothly. Diane encouraged dance teachers to advertise through OLLI.

The Pasadena Co-op recently participated in an outreach event at the Eagle Rock Community Center to which they were invited. A yearly event, various groups in the community contribute. Pat Cross and Don Krotser are the organizers of the Co-Op's contribution: musical performance and dance demonstration. It was a successful presentation.

NEW BUSINESS

Mindy Belli proposed that the Federation make the digital version of the *Scene* available at no cost. Benefits to this proposed change include a wider distribution, more efficient dissemination of events, less bookkeeping for dues. It was noted that electronic subscriptions cover part of the cost of the printed subscriptions. And, as printed versions are time-consuming to produce, it would be advantageous to encourage electronic over printed delivery. As Jay Michtom wasn't present, the issue was tabled until the next meeting.

Mindy Belli proposed that we honor donors by placing information about them in *Scene* or on the Federation website. Pros and cons of the proposal were discussed: would the donors be vulnerable to mining; difficult to find people to write about the donors. Diane suggested that Mindy write a note in Scene with a list of donors and invite people to write about them. The proposal was tabled.

Sandy Helperin mentioned that she was contacted by the son of Jim and Marian Fogle. Jim has passed away and Marian is in a care facility. They have a plethora of folk-dance music on record and tape. The son asked if anyone would be interested in taking the collection. No one volunteered.
