

COSTUME CORNER

RESEARCHING GREEK COSTUMES, PART I

Many beautiful books exist concerning Greek folk costumes—and some of them even have English versions. The most thoroughly researched, with every bit of each costume abundantly illustrated, is the 3volume, 50-year-long labor-of-love by Angelikí Hatzimicháli, The Greek Folk Costume (Melissa Publ., 1979, 1984) (see *Photos 1-4*). Hatzimicháli worked in Athens at the Benáki Museum, with its monumental collection of Greek folk art, and many of her illustrations are from objects, old photographs, and old drawings in that collection. The work was incomplete when she died, so Benáki Museum staff. especially Tatiana Ioánnou-Yiannara completed the work and published it. The first two volumes deal with women's costumes of two different types (those with a sigoúni and those with a kavádi). The third is said (v.1, p.19) to deal with men's costumes, but I have never been able to lay eyes on a copy or even learn its publication date!



Traditional Greek women's costumes have many parts to them, from the *pokámiso* (tunic-like chemise of plant-fiber) worn next to the body, to the ornate apron (podiá) piled on outermost. One of the most characteristic garments worn over the chemise is the sigoúni (Photo 5), which Hatzimicháli defines in the glossary (printed at the end of each volume!) as, most commonly, the "outer part of the costume, opening vertically in front, without sleeves and [usually] made from all wool material" (v.1, p.384). For the first 341 pages—and the book is large in all dimensions the material is laid out region by region, starting with local lore, color photos, and one or more old black-and-white photos of women wearing the particular sigoúni-type costume (Photo 6). Next are described and illustrated in color each and every costume piece, including the jewelry, that belonged to the outfit. Starting on p.344, the book then gives half-page pattern diagrams of the corresponding pokámiso and sigoúni of Attica, Eleúsis, and ten more of the areas discussed.

The woman on the right (like the others beyond her) wears the typical Kardítsa costume, with a heavily embroidered yiléko over a white sayiás with embroidered hem and fancy sleeves—the latter bearing the long, heavy tassels so typical of the Karagoúna area. These short vests are actually covered densely with thick silk thread—bright orange is a particular favorite—that has been "couched" on the surface rather than embroidered (i.e., going through the cloth).

Volume 2 takes up in similar manner the women's costumes that are based on the <code>kavádi</code>—a woolen or cotton coat, but with sleeves—and, after that, those with a <code>foustáni</code>, a long skirt. Perhaps the most famous costumes treated here—and my long-time favorite—are those of the Karagoúna people (<code>Cover, Photos 8, 9</code>), originally a group of transhumant shepherds who moved with their flocks to the mountains in the summers and to the plains of Thessaly in the winters, where the local farmers welcomed the fertilizing manure of the sheep as they grazed the stubble all winter. (This is why, in the song accompanying the familiar dance, <code>Karagoúna</code>, the lovelorn farmer complains that all summer he hasn't heard from the Karagoúna girl he loves. He also mentions her wearing a <code>sayiás</code>, a type of sleeved rather than sleeveless coat, typical of those who wintered around Kardítsa.)

<code>Foústa</code> is the basic Greek word for a skirt. Many of the costumes of Greek

Foústa is the basic Greek word for a skirt. Many of the costumes of Greek island women, especially in places influenced over centuries by Venice,

include a long, billowing skirt. In other regions, the form *foustáni* is used for a woman's long dress. These are included in Volume 2. The diminutive, *foustanélla*, however, is used for that famous pleated skirt worn by the Evzone Guards and—formerly—by men in much of Greece. The word itself, however, is not Greek, but comes from *Fustat*, the name of a city in Egypt that for many centuries supplied masses of cheap, coarse, sturdy linen to European peasants, and survives in English as *fustian*, a type of very durable twill cloth. But the *foustanélla* should be in Volume 3, if it exists. Let me know if you ever find a copy!

LAST DANCE



Donna Tripp, a beloved member of our folk dance community, an inspiring teacher, and a lifelong practitioner of many kinds of dance, died July 7th at the age of 96. Born in Minneapolis to Emily (Ehle) Cooper and Donald Cooper, Donna graduated from West High School before matriculating at the University of Minnesota. She took her first ballet lessons at the age of three and began performing at age 11. Thwarted from a professional ballet career by her height (5' 10"), Donna developed a knack for teaching ballet and other dance styles. She ran the ballet studio at the prestigious MacPhail School of Music, instructing 299 students, while completing her undergraduate degree.

Although she took pride in a 27-year career at Bank of America as a business analyst, Donna's abiding passion was folk dancing. She taught international dance at the Long Beach Jewish Community Center between 1961 and 1985. Donna performed with the Gandy Dancers and the Hungarian group Betyarok. She ultimately specialized in Nordic dance, co-leading the Scandia Dancers, comprised of couples performing traditional dance in folk costume. The group displayed Donna's choreography at numerous festivals in Finland and Norway. For nearly 60 years, Donna nurtured, mentored and befriended hundreds of dancers
